PBWorks (formerly PBWiki) is an online site which allows you to set up your own wiki site, which can be collaborative or just for your own use. In addition to the free account described here, PBWorks also provides paid accounts with more features.

Note: these instructions assume you do not already have a PBWorks account.


To create an account, go to the PBWorks site (http:pbworks.com) and choose **Sign up now** from the **For Education** pull-down menu:



Note: you will only need to follow these steps once – once your account is set up, you just need to click the **Log in** button.

You should choose the **Basic** plan which is free: click on the blue **Select** button under the word 'Free'.

You will see the sign up form:



You need to define the URL or web address your site will use - I suggest you use your initials and name. In the example, Nick Kumar has typed **njkumar** for his personal pbwiki account. The URL of Nick's site will be http://njkumar.pbworks.com.


Potential problem: After typing the address you'd like, you may see a message that says that name is taken – that means someone else is already using this URL. You'll have to change it to make it more distinctive. One way is to enter a number after your name - eg 'njkumar001'

Once you have entered a valid address, you need to fill out the rest of this page. You must enter a valid email address as PBWorks sends a confirmation to that address.

Once you get access to your workspace, you'll see your Front Page. You can click on the **edit** tab to edit the content of your Front Page. As a first step, you'll probably want to delete the default text!


If you are unfamiliar with creating wiki pages, click on the Help button (in the top right hand corner of the PBWorks screen) and click on **Workspace Basics**

To change who can access your workspace, click on **Settings** then on **Workspace Security**. It's usually most useful to set it up so that **Anyone** can view your wiki but only those you invite can edit it.



Tips:

Before you start creating pages, you might like to plan the structure of your wiki— you can use software to create an outline or a tree diagram, or (my favourite) sketch it roughly on a sheet of paper:



- Don't worry too much about formatting the text I suggest you leave this until later.
- Keep a local copy of your content, as well as entering it into the wiki. Just in case ©
- Try to avoid pasting the text directly from a word processor such as Microsoft Word – this can result in some very strange formatting.
